PARKING


Self-parking is \$22 per day and valet is \$42 per day.







The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) were instrumental in moving health care payments from the traditional volume-based fee-for-service models towards valuebased or risk adjusted payment models. This shift focuses on reducing the cost of health care in the U.S. while also giving healthcare providers incentives to improve their quality of care. These models require a risk adjustment methodology, with payment adjusted based on the burden of illness of each individual in a given benefit year. With increased enrollment in managed care plans and Accountable Care Organizations by facilities and medical groups, to include rural health clinics and federally qualified health centers, the focus is changing and showcases the importance of detailed clinical documentation, appropriate interpretation of the medical record documentation and accuracy of ICD-10-CM code assignment for chronic conditions and co-morbidities. 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
